

- She spent her life teaching the importance of freedom.








- Rosa Parks refused to give up her seat on the bus to a White Man

- Her bravery inspired the Montgomery Bus Boycott








Jackie Robinson By: Irina, Stayanna, and Neyshkalee

- He led peaceful protests for Black rights




Harriet Tubman By: Margaret, Cameron, Nijijuan

- He is an author of a book and a talented writer








Ruby Bridges By: Amar'e, Elijah, Khamli

Oprah Winfrey By: Sophia C, Julian, Analayah


- Oprah Winfrey was the first African American woman to own a production company
