WHAT ARE OUR HMS STUDENTS LEARNING?

It is important to celebrate teaching and learning at HMS. As building principal, I have the opportunity to visit classrooms and observe teachers and students at work. Sometimes, I get hooked on the lesson, and I join the discussions. In our weekly newsletter, I will often share classroom highlights to ensure parents gain understanding and appreciation of the work done here at HMS. When you ask your child, "What did you learn in school today?" You will refuse the answer, "Nothing."



Last week, our **social studies** teachers presented information about the attacks on our country on September 11, 2001. On Friday afternoon, I joined Mr. Tremper and his seventh grade students. We discussed the difference between a primary and secondary source, and then we watched a few different video clips highlighting the tragedy at the World Trade Center. Students were incredibly thoughtful and asked clarifying questions. Mr. Tremper shared his experience as a high school student hearing the news in

his classroom. In 2001, I was teaching middle school students, and I remember the urge to protect my students from learning the events. It was a frightening time for all of us. Yet, Mr. Tremper and his students discussed the positive outcomes, including the first responders who will always be remembered for their heroic work. Mr. Tremper ended the lesson by introducing students to Wells Crowther, the man in the red bandana. He was an American equities trader and volunteer firefighter who is remembered for saving as many people. We will never forget, and teachers will continue to share how we came together as a country in times of unthinkable devastation.

In **science**, students are learning how to be safe during lab activities. Our science teachers are setting the foundation for a safe environment in which students can experiment and discover scientific principles together. Students are participating in activities, such as singing, drawing, and performing, to demonstrate their understanding of these important expectations. I talked with Ms. Marcoux and some of her eighth grade students last week. They explained how they were using illustrations to highlight safety rules. All students and their parents will sign a safety contract, and students will need to pass a safety quiz with a score of 100 to participate in labs. In the weeks to come, eighth graders will start an earth science unit called *How is the Earth Changing*? and seventh graders will start a chemistry unit called *How Can I Make New Stuff from Old Stuff*?. Both the teachers and the students are excited to engage in all of the hands-on activities and labs these units include!



Imagine running in flip-flops? It is unsafe and difficult to be your best. **Please be sure your children are wearing sneakers to their physical fitness classes.** Students have physical education every other day. (A day or B day.) The four teachers will always embrace the opportunity to take kids outside, and we believe kids should be running, playing, and learning the importance of exercise.

In both grade levels, students are kicking off the year with a unit called Building a Community of Critical Readers and Writers in their **English** classes. This introductory unit was designed to encourage students to consider who they are and how it influences what they read and write. Books are windows and mirrors that allow the reader to see the world and themself. Students are learning to look at texts with a critical lens, as well as strategies to have a courageous conversation. When visiting Ms. Coggins and her seventh grade students, I was impressed with their focus and attention when reading a collection of short stories, first chapters, and a variety of novels in a padlet made for them. During this time, I was able to reconnect with one of my old favorites, "Eleven" by Sandra Cisneros. What a powerful story! Yes, it is the idea... we are helping our students better understand themselves and find authors who inspire them.

The best part of my work is visiting classes each day. Stay tuned for future classroom reports and highlights of student learning at HMS...

SETTING UP A HOMEWORK STATION FOR YOUR MIDDLE SCHOOLER

Every parent or guardian wants their child to be successful in school. Creating a homework station at home is just one way to support your child's developing positive study habits. Begin by selecting a specific area for

your scholar to complete homework assignments, projects and papers, read, and study. Having a quiet, comfortable, and uncluttered area that includes supplies needed to complete all assignments helps students in continuing learning after the school day ends. Remember, you don't need to be in a large house or spend a lot of money to make this happen. Consider these simple tips to make it work in any home:

- Find a quiet spot in your home without distractions or interruptions. With your child's 1-1 device, this doesn't have to be in a large corner with a desk and chair. It could be a cozy nook with a homemade lap desk and a bean bag, as long as this space doesn't become a nap zone!
- Be sure your child shares what he or she really needs in this space. Essentials may include pens, pencils, erasers, a hand-held pencil sharpener, college ruled notebooks or three ring paper, graph paper, index cards, highlighters, and a calculator recommended by your child's math teacher. These items can be kept in a basket, recycled milk crate, or on a simple, upcycled shelf.
- Any area meant for homework should be kept clear of other items that leave your scholar feeling distracted, as this will definitely draw attention away from school work.
- Ensuring your student is completing homework in the designated area and not in random parts of your home each day helps build good study skills and self-discipline around homework completion. This routine supports success.
- Consider making this space an enjoyable and calm space with fun or colorful walls, shelving, or accessories. A welcoming space is one your scholar is willing to go to in order to complete school-related assignments. Pinterest has great DIY ideas on a budget.
